# **A Celebration To Remember!**

2022 / 2023



Over 340 Tau Phis and their guests attended our four-day Centennial Celebration held on the Main Campus, and at T $\Phi\Delta$ , State College Ramada and Mont Alto Campus.

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**The 100-Year Flood At TOA** – Two short months after the centennial weekend and during the recent Christmas break, when temperatures in Happy Valley plummeted to sub-zero degrees, the boiler shut down and a main water pipe froze. Soon after, substantial flooding occurred causing significant damage in the basement and on the first-floor levels of the House.

Until further notice, access to the fraternity house at 427 East Fairmount is currently **CLOSED** to everyone—except State College Borough and Centre Region Code inspectors, property management staff, insurance company representatives, and authorized construction and mitigation company crews.

Please do **NOT** attempt to access the House (including parking lot and patio) unless otherwise authorized by the Tau Phi Delta Corporation Board. This <u>includes</u> during April's Blue-White Game as well as July's Jim Evans Memorial Golf Tournament and the week of the Central Pennsylvania Festival of the Arts (the Arts Fest).

Later, a ceremonial dedication for a  $T\Phi\Delta$ Centennial Tree, along with a pewter display placard (below), was held near Conklin Hall.





# The Honorable Phis' Reports

**B**rothers, allow me to share with you my thoughts about "Our 100-Year Celebration" and "The 100-Year Flood."

Since we last met in-person in April 2022, your Corporation's Board of Directors has held monthly virtual meetings to conduct the business of Tau Phi Delta. There has been a tremendous amount of activity behind the scenes to identify and implement improvements within our organization. In order to manage the large scope of work in an aging house, our Development Team hired Nittany Co-op property managers to help us with Phase One of the improvement projects.

We had deep cleanings, fresh paint, improved lighting and electrical repairs. Our kitchen appliances were cleaned and serviced to the delight of our cook, Patti. We ordered new plates, cups, bowls, utensils, and necessary kitchen equipment that has not been upgraded or replaced in years. We ordered new industrial rectangular tables and chairs. We purchased six new leather sofas for the chapter room just in time for our Centennial Celebration. We welcomed home hundreds of our Brothers, Little Sisters and their guests with a clean, fresh-looking, uncluttered fraternity house complete with fall decorations. What a great event! Delicious food and drinks along with lots of laughter and selfies! Forgotten stories were retold of our times together over the years. We were delighted to hear many compliments on the condition of our House and the current Brothers' commitment to maintaining the fraternity.

We shared the vision of our Phase Two and beyond renovations for our House and announced a call to continue to donate funds to both the Foundation and Corporation.

As the Christmas holidays rolled around, the temperatures in north-central Pennsylvania plummeted to below zero. Then our boiler shutdown, we had a pressurized sprinkler system pipe in the basement freeze and burst and six inches of water filled into the chapter room, dining and bar area. Thus the 100-Year Flood of  $T\Phi\Delta$ .

We took immediate action and engaged our insurance carrier and started the restoration process. We had to close the House <u>until further notice</u>.

We worked with returning students to retrieve their belongings from the House and transitioned to alternate housing for the semester. Our Actives continue to thrive in spite of it all and have managed to recruit a spring pledge class of five! We hired a local general contractor to further hire and manage all of the subcontractors that will be involved in replacement of all damaged infrastructure including, to name a few: electrical panels, water heaters, whole house boiler heating system and fire alarm systems to name a few. We have great insurance to cover all property damaged as well as loss of rental income.

Our goal is to have the  $T\Phi\Delta$ fraternity house re-opened in August of 2023 for the fall semester. To achieve this goal, the Development Committee will only focus on what needs to be done to get the House opened for Actives to move back in.

Yes, these *are* challenging times and as Tau Phi's—we *will* rise again! We are looking for a few good men to come alongside us as we rebuild.

Please feel free to contact me to see how you can get more involved. One way is to attend the upcoming spring, board of directors meeting.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve this Brotherhood. We are all in this together!

Greetings, Brothers. As you know a lot has been happening at 427 East Fairmount Avenue ... Not all good, but not all bad, either!

Coming off our centennial high, we heard a tremendous outpouring of gratitude and satisfaction regarding the entire lineup of the weekend celebration. I must yet commend the Centennial Committee,

especially Co-Chair CHRISTINE EBERHART. The group was comprised of some hardworking other Alumni Little Sisters and Brothers, as well as those from the Foundation, Corporation Board of Directors (BOD) and many Active Brothers! Great work, folks, and thank all of you that had the opportunity to attend this historic moment of  $T\Phi\Delta$  fraternity.

If you didn't make it back, I guarantee your name was brought up with all the reminiscing and story-telling that was going on!

Now back to reality. First, the Grand National has been working closely with the BOD and the Development Committee to mitigate the Tau Phi Delta's "100-Year Flood" damage that occurred over Christmas break. Again it was when a water pipe froze and broke, causing severe water damage to the basement and

ground floor levels. The ultimate goal is to get our Brothers back into the House as soon as possible while putting the fraternity house back together efficiently and productively! The Development Committee was formed in October 2021, and out of this committee, renderings were produced and displayed at the Centennial to showcase the much-needed updates our House required—along with a very hefty price tag. Little did we know or realize how instrumental not only the renderings are but how important the brothers are that make up the Development Committee. As part of this committee, I can assure you these men are working diligently to put our fraternity back together. Their expertise, knowledge, skill set, contacts, and, most importantly, time is extremely valuable dealing with insurance claims, infrastructure repairs, water damage mitigation, required building codes and ongoing meetings with contractors.

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Secondly, the Grand National Officers and BOD's Phi, RICH **KAPPEL**, have been discussing Tau Phi Delta's need to better stream-line information, communicate more effectively and organize documents (i.e., taxes, bylaws, officer descriptions, Penn State requirements, Borough regulations, etc.) to attain continuity when officers transition.

Lastly, the Grand National has been contemplating membership with the Lion Fraternity Alumni Association (LFAA).

LFAA President, Dr. Jim Edwards, was the keynote speaker on the Sunday morning brunch at our Centennial Celebration. Dr. Edwards spoke about LFAA role of advocating for fraternities with the University's imposing, overzealous, heavy-handed mandates and requirements, as well as State College Borough.

He was also instrumental, along with some other LFAA board members, in helping our Active Brothers find housing after being displaced. More to come on our role with LFAA.

Again, the LFAA exists for the following purposes:

- To advocate for the fraternities at PSU with the University, Borough, our neighbors and the general community.
- To promote fraternalism between alumni chapters.
- To share best practices between alumni chapters.
- To work together to build a better fraternity system at Penn State.
- To develop and share relevant educational activities for fraternity undergraduates and alumni.

As we move forward, the key element of our success is that the Active Brothers continue to stick together and operate Tau Phi Delta as best and efficiently as possible.

I'd encourage you to reach out to the Actives via email or text to show your support as Alumni, and so they know how



instrumental they are in continuing the traditions of Tau Phi Delta!

Thanks to all who showed up to visit and support Tau Phi Delta!


As most of you know, the proceeds we raise for the Foundation are used for the future of Tau Phi Delta, as we represent our fraternity's non-profit educational entity that was formed in 2009.

It was created by Alumni Brothers to support the educational opportunities provided to the local chapter of Tau Phi Delta Fraternity.

As a 501(c)(3) public charity, the Foundation provides a taxdeductible way to support the education of current and future members of Tau Phi Delta.

One of our educational programs is the Tau Phi Delta

Scholarship. Through the years, we've recognized over a dozen worthy Active Brothers with such scholarships. In 2022 during the centennial evening banquet, we handed out another scholarship of \$1,500 to Br. ETHAN KILLIAN.

This spring we will be accepting applications for even more scholarships from the Active Brothers.

A large part of our scholarship fund comes from our Annual Jim **Evans Memorial Golf** Tournament with a few additional monies coming from other events such as the T $\Phi\Delta$  Speaker Seminars. We are continuing to host such educational events (most recent was "The 9-11 Survivor Tree" presentation held on campus) and major fundraiser events like the one held during our recent 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary. # Old House Heritage By Bill Herb (Fall '65)

This series is normally about "tales from the old fraternity house." Thus, during the recent Centennial Celebration, a few tales were told about a tradition at Tau Phi Delta that dates back to 1924 with the development of a "Brother's Pin."



**Brother's Pin** ~ No, not the small ceremonial Colorado spruce tree lapel pin often referred to as the "Brother's Recognition Pin," but rather, a finely crafted, 10k gold shield that, at times, was available with crest of rare gems. Along our Greek letters, there's a pair of

inlaid gold pinecones surrounded by our fraternal motto: *Omen Andres*.

**Pinmates** ~ So, during this recent gathering, the question came up at a table filled with a mixture of a few Brothers from both past and presen,. "Are there Pinmates anymore?"

Back in the day, when a Brother had more than casual intentions toward a young lady, he would give her his fraternity pin. So, upon "pinning" her, she would become his "Pinmate."

Actually, I have been told that the last time a Brother ordered and bought (and gave) such a special pin from the jeweler was in 1977. However more recently, several have been found and purchased on eBay. Including the one shown above, with the engraved initials of "LEF" and a date of "1925." It was purchased online for a *mere* \$270.

**Pole Party** ~ Generally, this "pinning" was a private, almost secretive, ceremony, because once the act was discovered, the Brother was in imminent danger of a trip to the "pole."

This enforced trip was usually a crime of

opportunity. At some indeterminate time after the pinning, just as the Brother was thinking that perhaps he was in the clear, the moment would arise.

Usually, this moment occurred during some House social function, ideally one in which the potential victim was in some sort of diminished state and when his Pinmate was present.

As I recall, the victim would be tackled by one of the Brothers who would loudly announce, "Pole Party!" At that time the befogged pinned Brother realized what was coming and would struggle violently to escape. However, more and more Brothers would join in, and the victim-to-be was dragged out to our flagpole in the front yard overlooking East Fairmount Avenue.

Usually, he was tied—inverted at times—to the flagpole. Other times, he was suspended by his feet from the flag halyard, which always scared the "halyard" out of me when the pole bent like a four-weight fly rod taming a lunker.

For those without any maritime experience, a halyard is the rope used for raising and lowering a sail, flag or yard on a sailing ship. Thus, the name halyard.

In any event, the unlucky pinner was immobilized, and his sweetheart (aka Pinmate) was handed a large bucket of water which she used to soak her beloved. This was mildly uncomfortable in warmer weather, but if the event was in the winter, it was heartstopping—sort of like a naked visit to the North Pole at any time of year.

After this, the hapless Brother was anointed with the contents of numerous ketchup and mustard squeeze bottles, which resulted in deposits of the condiments in parts of his anatomy which had not been so seasoned since Hell Week.



(What is Hell Week? Well, we will have to save that discussion for another day.) [←] Here is photographic evidence of Br. Jack McCandless (Fall '65) during his Pole Party. By the way, Jack and his Pinmate, and now his wife, Kathie, are still together after 50-plus years.
